**Antipholus of Syracuse** - (m. 20-60) The twin brother of Antipholus of Ephesus and the son of Egeon; (M 20-50) He has been traveling the world with his slave, Dromio of Syracuse, trying to find his long-lost brother and mother. (184 lines)

**Antipholus of Ephesus** - (M 20-60) The twin brother of Antipholus of Syracuse and the son of Egeon; he is a well-respected merchant in Ephesus and Adriana's husband. (117 Lines)

**Dromio of Syracuse** - (m/f 17-50) The bumbling, comical slave of Antipholus of Syracuse. He is the twin brother of Dromio of Ephesus. (103 lines)

**Dromio of Ephesus** - (m/f 17-50) The bumbling, comical slave of Antipholus of Ephesus. He is the Syracusan Dromio's twin brother. (90 lines)

Adriana - (f. 20-60) The wife of Antipholus of Ephesus, she is a fierce, jealous woman. (179 lines)

**Luciana** - (f. 20-50) Adriana's unmarried sister and the object of Antipholus of Syracuse's affections. (64 lines)

Solinus - (m/f. 30-79) The Duke of Ephesus; a just but merciful ruler. (51 lines)

**Egeon** - (m. 30-79) A Syracusan merchant, husband of the Abbess (Emilia), and the father of the two Antipholi. He is, like his Syracusan son, in search of the missing half of his family; he has been sentenced to death as the play begins. (74 lines)

**Abbess** - (f. 30-79) Emilia, the long-lost wife of Egeon and the mother of the two Antipholi. 32 lines)

Balthasar - (m/f 20-79) A merchant in Syracuse. (9 lines)

**Angelo** - (m/f 20-79) A goldsmith in Syracuse and a friend to Antipholus of Ephesus. (59 lines) **Merchant** - (m/f 20-79) An Ephesian friend of Antipholus of Syracuse. (9 lines)

Second Merchant - (m/f 20-79) A tradesman to whom Angelo is in debt. (27 lines)

**Doctor Pinch** - (m/f 20-79) A schoolteacher, conjurer, and would-be exorcist. (10 lines)

**Luce** - (f. 20-50) Also called Nell. Antipholus of Ephesus' prodigiously fat maid and Dromio of Ephesus' wife. (12 lines)

**Courtesan** - (f-17-60) An expensive prostitute and friend of Antipholus of Ephesus. (24 lines)
